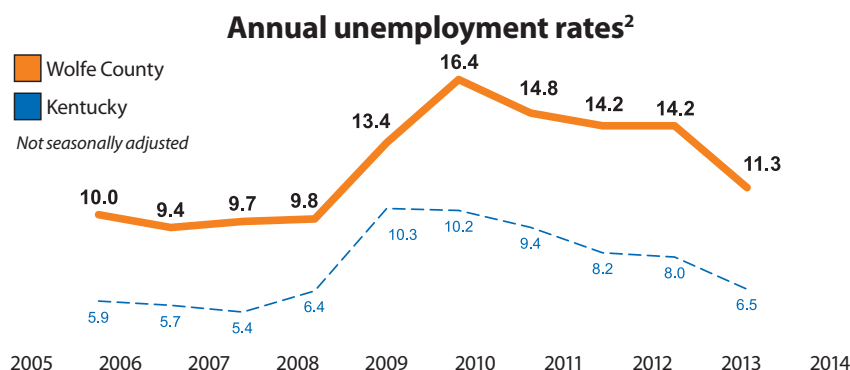
OUR FOCUS

Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) Extension is committed to improving the health and well-being of individuals and families in Wolfe County. To help Kentuckians strengthen their financial, physical, and social well-being, our educational programs focus on:

SPOTLIGHT ON...

DIABETES SERIES IS IN DEMAND

The Wolfe County FCS Extension agent partnered with the Campton Rural Health Clinic and the Wolfe County Diabetes Coalition to offer Take Ownership of Your Diabetes, a six-week program with sessions on the ABCs of Diabetes, Think of Your Plate, Carbohydrate Counting, Glucose Monitoring, Foot Care, and Your Health Team. At the last session, the group requested to continue to meet at least monthly. One lady who had been coming to Extension programs for several years said, "This has been the best series of programs I have ever attended at Extension and I have learned so much."

FINANCIAL WELL-BEING

In Wolfe County, the median household income in 2013 was **\$25,657 (+/- \$2,512)** compared to \$43,307 (+/- \$631) for the state.³

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013:⁴

- **47.8% (+/-12.2)** of families with related children were below poverty
- **22.9% (+/-8.0)** of people age 65 and over were below poverty
- **8.0% (+/-6.0)** of individuals working full time/full year in the previous 12 months were below poverty
- **76.7%** of students were eligible for free lunches and **4.0%** were eligible for reduced-price lunches in 2014-2015⁵

As a result of participating in Wolfe County Extension programs:¹

- **150** youth increased problem-solving or decision making skills.
- **146** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.

PHYSICAL WELL-BEING

According to the CDC's County Diabetes Atlas, in Wolfe County in 2012:⁶

- **12.1% (15.6%-9.3%)** of adults reported having been diagnosed with diabetes
- **32.5% (39.1%-26.3%)** of adults 18 years and over were obese
- **33.7% (40.6%-27.4%)** of adults reported no leisure-time exercise in the past month

Between 2006-2012 in Wolfe County:⁷

- **42.8% (54.1%-32.3%)** of adults reported having been diagnosed with high blood pressure
- **35.0% (43.1%-27.7%)** of adults reported fair or poor health

In Wolfe County:

- **35.3%** had adequate access to locations for physical activity compared to 72.0% for the state⁸
- **40.6% (+/-10.9)** of those who drive to work on their own have a commute that is more than 30 minutes (2009-2013)⁸
- **17** deaths were from a drug overdose between 2009-2013⁹

As a result of participating in Wolfe County Extension programs:¹

- **126** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- **550** children and youth learned to eat more healthy food.

SOCIAL WELL-BEING

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013 in Wolfe County:⁴

- **28.6% (+/-2.7)** of households included one or more persons age 65 and over
- **120 (+/-74)** grandparents lived with and were responsible for their own grandchildren
- **37.6% (+/-19.1)** of children under 6 years and **42.2% (+/-13.4)** of children 6-17 years had all parents in the labor force
- **0 (+/-16)** of those age 5 and older spoke a language other than English at home
- **419 (+/-118)** civilian veterans lived in Wolfe County⁴

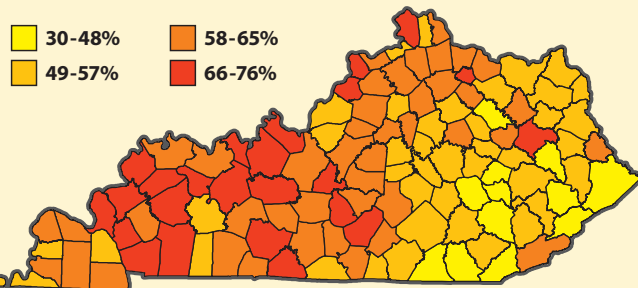
In Wolfe County:

- **26.6% (36.3%-18.8%)** of adults ages 18+ reported they did not receive sufficient social-emotional support between 2006-12⁷
- **62** children were determined to have been victims of child abuse or neglect in 2013¹⁰
- **44.1%** of those registered to vote did so in the 2014 General Election¹¹

As a result of participating in Wolfe County Extension programs:¹

- **45** adults reported increased leadership skills, knowledge or confidence.
- **773** people were reached with information related to health and safety.
